

Significance

In Exodus we witness God beginning to fulfill His promises to Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob. Though the children of Israel were enslaved in a foreign land, God miraculously and dramatically delivered them to freedom. He then established Israel as a theocratic nation under His covenant with Moses on Mount Sinai. The ten plagues, the Passover, the parting of the Red Sea, the fearsome majesty of God's presence at Mount Sinai, the giving of the Ten Commandments, the building of the tabernacle . . . these events from Exodus are foundational to the Jewish faith. And they provide crucial background context to help future readers of Scripture understand the entire Bible's message of redemption. 

Significance

Leviticus is mostly laws that kept the Hebrew people safe, healthy, and peaceful.

It is decreed in this book that priests shall be members of the tribe of Levi and descendants of Moses' brother Aaron. Moses describes things are that are considered "unclean," such as various animals and insects.

God's purpose was to protect people from germs and unhealthy living.

Moses teaches the Day of Atonement. It is a ceremony that takes place only once a year. The High Priest enters into the Holy of Holies (the most special part of the tabernacle) and offers a sacrifice to God for sins of the entire nation. No one else could go in there.







Significance

The Book of Deuteronomy contains a repeat of all the Mosaic laws, plus the death of Moses. It is the only book in the first five to record Moses' death.

The children who had left Egypt were adults when Deuteronomy was written. They were quite ready to battle for the Promised Land. Deuteronomy repeats the laws in other books, specifically directing it to this new generation.

The last few chapters describe Moses' final blessing on the children of Israel as well as his death (which must have been written by another person).



Significance

The time of the judges brought about great apostasy in Israel. The nation underwent political and religious turmoil as the people tried to possess those parts of the land that had not yet been fully conquered. The tribes fought among themselves, as well, nearly wiping out the tribes of Manasseh and Benjamin. The pattern of behavior in the book of Judges is clear: the people rebelled through idolatry and disbelief, God brought judgment through foreign oppression, God raised up a deliverer-or judge, and the people repented and turned back to God. When the people fell back into sin, the cycle started over again.



Significance

The book was written from Naomi's point of view. Every event related back to her; her husband's and sons' deaths. her daughters-in-law, her return to Bethlehem, her God, her relative, Boaz, her land to sell, and her progeny. Almost without peer in Scripture, this story views "God through the eyes of a woman."

The book reveals the extent of God's grace-He accepted Ruth into His chosen people and honored her with a role in continuing the family line into which His appointed king, David, and later His Son, Jesus, would be born (Matthew 1:1, 5).

Significance

First Samuel focuses on the establishment of the monarchy. The people demanded a king, similar to the kings of the surrounding nations. Saul, the first king, though "head and shoulders above the rest" did not have a righteous heart, and his line was destined never to inherit the crown. God instructed Samuel to anoint David, the youngest son of Jesse of Bethlehem, as the next king.



2 Samuel chronicles the establishment of David's dynasty and the expansion of Israel under God's chosen leader. The book opens as David learns of Saul's death. His lament over the deaths of Saul and of Jonathan, David's unlikely best friend, demonstrated David's personal grief over their demise. The Lord soon set David over the tribe of Judah and then over all Israel as His anointed king, uniting all twelve tribes into a tight-knit nation.



Significance

First Kings reveals Solomon's relationship with Yahweh, emphasizing Solomon's divinely given wisdom and wealth. Solomon's reputation reached far beyond Israel's borders to modern-day Yemen, the queen of Sheba's likely home. Solomon's numerous marriages and extensive harem are the stuff of legends, but they led to his wandering faith in later years. Solomon did, however, build the temple, God's permanent dwelling place among His people. First Kings also introduces the prophet Elijah, who pronounced God's judgment on the evil northern king Ahab. In addition to performing other miracles, Elijah won a dramatic confrontation with false prophets on Mount Carmel.



Chapter 13 covers the death of Elisha.

The book covers the reigns of many kings of Israel and Judah, telling short stories about some of the most notable, good and evil. It ends with Chapter 25 and the Babylonian invasion of Judah when Solomon's temple was destroyed.

Significance

In Chronicles, the history of Israel is told through a priestly perspective. The chronicler devoted significant attention to proper worship of Yahweh and adherence to the regulations of His Law. The author included David's decisions on the proper manner in which to undertake moving the ark of the covenant (1 Chronicles 13, 15-16) and detailed descriptions of its return to Jerusalem. The chronicler even highlighted one of David's psalms (16:8-36). We read the story of how David purchased the threshing floor of Ornan the Jebusite, which he then designated as the future site of the temple (21:15-30). Though David desired to build the temple, God revealed to him that David's son Solomon would have that honor (17:1-14).

Notable Verses

In another battle with the Philistines, Elhanan son of Jair killed Lahmi the brother of Goliath the Gittite, who had a spear with a shaft like a weaver's rod. In still another battle, which took place at Gath, there was a huge man with six fingers on each hand and six toes on each foot-twenty-four in all. He also was descended from Rapha. When he taunted Israel, Ionathan son of Shimea, David's brother, killed him.

It continues with information and stories about Solomon building the Temple through Chapter 8.The Queen of Sheba visits Solomon in Chapter 9.2 Chronicles covers the reigns of all the kings of Israel and Judah after the split of the united kingdom of Kings Saul, David, and Solomon.

Like the Kings, this book gives little snippets about each king and notes whether they grieved or pleased the Lord. (Only a handful, all from Judah, pleased the Lord.)The closing chapter, 36, summarizes the 70 years of captivity in the Great Exile and also summarizes Cyrus, King of Persia, releasing the Jews to go home and his funding of the rebuilding of the Temple.

Sometime around 760 BC, God sent Jonah to Nineveh to preach repentance and hope to the Assyrian people, a message they heard and adopted-at least for a time. One hundred years later, during the time of Nahum, the Assyrians had returned to their bullish ways, conquering the northern kingdom of Israel and lording their power over Judah in the south. Jonah failed to realize what Nahum reminded the people of Judah: God's justice is always right and always sure. Should He choose to grant mercy for a time, that good gift will not compromise the Lord's ultimate sense of justice for all in the end.

he seven books included in this volume are books from the era of the Old Testament that were not included in the Hebrew canon. The seven books include Tobit, Judith, Baruch, The Wisdom of Solomon, The Wisdom of Ben Sira, and 1 & 2 Maccabees. As mentioned, they are not included in the Hebrew canon or the Protestant Bible. To Protestants, they are considered "apocryphal" which means "hidden, concealed, or false and inauthentic." Protestants do not consider the books to have the canonical authority or to be divinely inspired literature. Catholic and Orthodox Christians, on the other hand, do consider these books to be divinely inspired and retain them in their canons.

Whatever you feel about the inspiration of these books, they are undoubtedly valuable in the history, wisdom, and insight they provide. Tobit and Judith are fantastic stories that highlight the power and faithfulness of God. The Wisdom of Solomon and Ben Sira is very similar to Proverbs in that they contain nuggets of wisdom, and Baruch and 1 & 2 Maccabees provide valuable history into the intertestamental period of Jewish history.



Significance

The story begins with the father of Tobit (whose name also was Tobit) having been exiled to Nineveh around 720 BC. The Assyrians invaded the northern kingdom of Israel in 722 BC and exiled the people to several other countries. The father Tobit had gone blind. In extreme poverty, both father and son continued to serve others and God. The father sent the son to the Media to try to recover a debt from an old friend. If the friend could be found and agreed to pay, the family would have money for food.

Tobit Jr. is accompanied by the angel Raphael, whom he thinks is simply a handsome and kind Ninevite. The angel sees him through many trials on the road, including the taking of a wife whose seven groomsmen had been killed by a demonic force. Raphael shows Tobias how to use fish entrails (guts) to drive away from the dark forces, and upon their successful return to Nineveh, how to use them to cure his father's ailing vision.

The book is great for teaching people how to behave while under stress. Tobit's example, similar to Job's, shows that God comes to the rescue and rewards those who love him and continue serving to share his love, even when trials come our way.





The book of Judith opens with some war history that is either fictional or poorly translated. In this story, King Nebuchadnezzar is the king of Assyria rather than king of Babylon, as he is in our Old Testament. He defeats many kingdoms. He destroyed countries, their shrines, and their gods, insisting they worship him as a god.

God's people surrounding Jerusalem were terrified. They had just returned from a 70-year exile to Babylon and were struggling to exist as a nation. Israel's leadership ordered people to fast and pray in the temple.


A warrior named Achior told the Assyrian army of the history of the Jews. He suggested they don't invade the Jews if they are innocent, because their God would seek revenge. Achior was ousted, having infuriated the military leaders, who placed him where the army thought Israel would kill him. But the Jews were grateful for his story and continued to pray.


The widow Judith enters the story after Nebuchadnezzar's army had cut off the people's water supply and they were collapsing in the streets. She begged the elders to continue to worship God and suggested that this was a test. She also asked to be released from the town to do something to the enemy she would not speak about. They agreed.

She executed a plan to deceive the Assyrian army commander, Holofernes, into thinking he could seduce her. When he drank so much that he passed out, she stabbed him twice, beheaded him, and sneaked his head out of the camp in a food satchel.

She returned to Judah with the head and told the army to attack the Assyrians. The Israelites drove the enemy back and defeated them. Judith lived long and was remembered fondly.



Significance

The text divides into two main sections. The first part includes Chapters 1-10 and covers the theme of wisdom in many ways. The first section is written from the perspective of a king writing to other kings and teaches that ungodly living stands in contrast with wisdom.

Popular Stories

No real stories in this book, just a collection of wisdom sayings. One interesting feature is that there are many parallels within the book to sayings of Jesus in the New Testament, leading many scholars to believe Jesus absolutely had access to the book.

Important Facts

- (V) It was initially thought that Solomon wrote this book but was later disproven.
- It is very similar to Proverbs in that it is more a collection of sayings than a narrative.



Significance

The contents of the Wisdom of Ben Sira are not easily divided into separate parts.

Chapters 1-43 deal largely with moral instruction. They sound a bit like Proverbs, only with more poetic sentencing, 44:1-50:24 contain a eulogy of the heroes of Israel, in the spirit of the writer of Hebrews who wrote about faith in Chapter 11. In the end, the author expresses his gratitude to God (51:1-12) and invites the unschooled to acquire true wisdom (51:13-30)

Popular Stories

- This book is another one that is more a collection of savings and maxims than a book with stories.
- The last half of the book recalls stories of famous Old Testament prophets and figures like Elijah, Moses, David, Joshua, etc.

Important Facts

- This book was written by Ben Sira (Sirach) a wise man in Jerusalem.
- This book focuses on the value of Wisdom.

Notable Verses

"The Word of God on high is the source of wisdom, whose steps are eternal commandments. To whom has the root of wisdom been revealed, and who has recognized her astuteness? To whom has the discipline of wisdom been revealed and made manifest? And who has understood the multiplicity of her steps? The highest omnipotent Creator is One, and he is the mighty King, and he is exceeding to be feared, sitting upon his throne, and he is the sovereign God."



Fifth Book of the Seven Deuterocanonical Books Found in the Catholic Old Testament





Written Around: 582 BC



Significance

The work attempts to explain the trauma of the Great Exile in terms of cycles of Israel's sins: punishment, repentance, and return. It is divided into four sections:

- Letter to Jerusalem (1:1 to 3:8)-In this letter, Baruch
 offers a confession that applies to all the exiled
 citizens of the southern kingdom of Judah. It is likely
 that by hearing it and saying it aloud, the people
 were able to conceive collectively of the weight of
 their sins.
- Praise of wisdom (3:9 to 4:4)-Baruch starts by saying how much the people have lost by not seeking wisdom and then goes into praise of those who change their ways to seek it.
- A series of addresses meant to console the people, including Baruch addressing the exiles in Babylon; Jerusalem addresses its neighboring countries and then addresses the people in exile, and finally, Baruch addresses those who remain in Jerusalem;
- Letter of Jeremiah (6:1-72), supposedly from the great prophet. The chapter is a fantastic encouragement of why people should not worship other gods.

Popular Stories

- This book is another one that is more a collection of sayings and maxims than a book with stories.
- The last half of the book recalls stories of famous Old Testament prophets and figures like Elijah, Moses, David, Joshua, etc.



Significance

The book gives an overview of the history behind the revolt. Then, several sections cover the battles of the Maccabean father and his warrior sons Judas, Jonathan, and Simon, each one taking up the cause after the previous was martvred.

Popular Stories

⊘ ANTIOCHUS EPIPHANES DEFILES THE TEMPLE One of the precipitating issues of the Maccabean Wars

was that Antiochus Epiphanes, the Greek king desecrated the Temple by sacrificing a pig on the altar, erecting an altar to Zeus, and destroying all of the sacred vessels and writings. In the narrative, this was the last straw for Judah Maccabee and his cohorts.

The festival of Hanukkah comes from this story. After Judah defeats the Greek army and restores the Temple, he wanted to keep the menorah lit every day. However, even though there was not enough oil to keep it lit, it staved lit for seven days. This is the origin of the festival of Hanukkah.

Notable Verses

"And Mattathias exclaimed with a loud voice in the city, saying, "All who hold zeal for the law, maintaining the covenant, let them follow me."



Seventh Book of the Seven Deuterocanonical Books Found in the Catholic Old Testament





Significance

The book opens with the horrific martyrdom of a woman and her seven sons who refused to eat pork while on display in some sort of pagan court. A scribe name Eleazar had likewise been killed by unspeakable violence for the same reason. The book uses these and other horrific tales to illustrate what faithful Jews were willing to go through to defend their faith. It was meant to serve as an example for suffering Jews in all eras.

Popular Stories

- Rather than focusing on the military exploits within the Maccabean revolts, 2 Maccabees focuses on God's intervention. The story is still focused on Judah Maccabees and how God used him to deliver his people.
- A man named Heliodorus from the king's army occupied the temple and was prepared to remove the sacred vessels. While he was attempting to do this, an angel on a horse appeared in golden armor with two other angels and beat Heliodorus badly. He was later told that his life was spared because of the intercession of Onias, the high priest.
- A mother with seven sons was captured and forced to eat pork. The sons declared that they would rather die than be defiled in this way. Each of the sons was tortured and killed for their rebellion, concluding with the mother.

Notable Verses

"So then, I beg those who will read this book, let them not be repelled by these adverse events, but let them consider that these things happened, not for the destruction, but for the correction, of our people."

- The Catholic Church has based its doctrines of both purgatory and masses for the dead on the text with 2 Maccabees

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


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


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
